There's a New Mayor in Town

Now it's you turn! I want you to work with a partner and create a local government of your own. You will then use your created government to demonstrate your understanding of the structure and functions of local governments. You are also tasked with creating a brief summary of the role of our provincial government that citizens in your local government can resort to for information.



Here are some important things help you create your own local government:

Local Government:

- Where is your local government?
 - o Is it a rural or urban setting?
 - $\circ\;$ What is the name of the town your government runs?
- What is the structure of your local government?
 - $\circ \ \ \text{How are representatives elected?}$
- What are some of the responsibilities that your local government has?
 - $\circ \;$ 3-5 functions/responsibilities of your local government.

Provincial Government:

- \bullet How is your local government influenced by the provincial government?
- Create a summary of the functions of provincial government for citizens in your local division to refer to.

Current Issue:

- I want you and your partner to find a current issue or create a possible issue that your local government is facing.
- Using this problem, I want you to explain how citizens in your community influence the decision-making processes surrounding the issue.
- In other words, what are the roles of citizens in local government matters? • What are the rights and responsibilities of citizens in terms of

governance?

Format:

- Create a town map that includes the key elements listed above.
- Hold a press conference introducing your town and its government.
- \bullet Create a pamphlet that introduces your town and government to visitors and newcomers.

You will be asked to fill out both a planning page and a checklist for this assignment. The planning page will need to be viewed by the teacher before continuing forward. The checklist is to be used near the end of the project to ensure you have all of the required information.
